Syrians' Thoughts on Citizenship and Identity:

The Day After Association has issued a report entitled "Syrians' Thoughts on Citizenship and Identity", aiming to identify the general

sub-identities and their relationship to the concept of citizenship; equal rights and duties among all citizens, regardless of their affiliations; and how these form an essential part of dialogues among local and political actors, and the extent these identities impact on issues of equality in terms of political, economic, cultural, and civil rights. The report was prepared on the basis of a survey conducted in mid-2021, and included interviews with 2,651 Syrians, 50.1% men and 49.9% women, inside and outside Syria, from various religious, national, age and educational backgrounds. The interviews were conducted by a working team of 52 male and female researchers present inside Syria, in neighboring countries and in Europe.



Sessions in Aleppo Northern Countryside on Reporting Forcibly

Over the course of two days, Judge Anwar Majanni answered these questions to an audience of 14 female and male survivors of detention in Syria, as part of the capacity-raising and legal awareness training provided by The Day After to support survivors. Judge Majanni reviewed the experiences of countries that have been through the transitional justice phase, and explained the difference between transitional and traditional justice. Participants expressed their visions and recommendations regarding the role of survivors and victims' associations in the transitional justice



After several sessions on mechanisms for reporting forcibly disappeared persons in Raqqa, presented by TDA to a group of families with missing relatives, a woman succeeded in uncovering the fate of her husband. After submitting an official request to SDF General Security Forces and the prison administration, they admitted they had him and that he is under investigation and after the verdict is issued, they will be allowed to Another woman decided to report her husband was missing in Lattakia since 2013, fate unknown to date. Legal support was provided after a group of people seized her husband's property, and legal advisors first provided her with documentation services, then filed a lawsuit to expel the individuals who had seized control of the property; as a result of the lawsuit, they were expelled and the property returned to her and her children, and she obtained compensation for "loss of benefit".

Psychological Support and Capacity Building Sessions for Detention Survivors TDA was able to provide psychological support sessions to 154 female detention survivors in northern Syria and 9 female survivors in Turkey.

TDA also continued capacity-building exercises for Adra Association, who received training on strategic planning, as well as psychological support sessions. Under the supervision of the Center for Victims of Torture (CVT), they were put in touch with the International Committee for Missing Persons through an introductory session that took place with the entire committee team and members of the Adra Association.

Disappeared Persons Through communication officers in Syria and the cooperation of the International Commission on Missing Persons and TDA's Survivors Project, TDA held two sessions for families of forcibly disappeared persons, to teach them how to report missing relatives. The team of communication officers split beneficiaries into two groups, the first attended by 25 beneficiaries on 2829- July. The second session was attended by 15 beneficiaries on August 18. The two groups were shown explanatory videos about the work No. of beneficiaries: 40 of the International Commission, including defining missing persons, and communication officers explained the mechanism for reporting missing persons through the ICMP website. Launching the Association of Families of Missing Detainees in Idlib Countryside 20 female relatives of forcibly disappeared persons in Syria launched an association for families of missing detainees in Idlib and Salgin. Over the course of two months (July and August), the Association worked on the "Search for Them" initiative. Prior to the Association's launch, the women received training from Change Makers Organization in Syria with financial support from TDA, on documentation, its importance and benefits. They also increased their communication, mobilization and advocacy capabilities. Disappeared but not Forgotten ... On the International Day of Victims of Enforced Disappearances, The Day After produced a video documenting the situation of families of forcibly disappeared persons, and the suffering they endured waiting for news of their loved ones... **CLICK HERE Training for detention survivors** مرسین 💡 The suffering and the rights of detainees in Syria are forgotten and lost with no clear legal mechanism or method to document the conditions of their detention and the violations they were subjected to. Accordingly, TDA trained 11 survivors over 3 days on documentation, its types and benefits, and an explanation of documentation mechanism and components. This is to preserve evidence from becoming lost or forgotten, and to help achieve #justice in future trials, to identify patterns of crimes committed, where they were committed and who was responsible, and to use this information in scientific research and general reports. For the psychological well-being of survivors, psychological support sessions were provided to them before, during and after the documentation processes. THE DAY AFTER
